His last years were marked by illness rendering him housebound.

May 2024

Mersey Shipping Line Introduces New 'Green' Vessels

BG Freight Line has unveiled its 'greenest ships yet' – four vessels that will carry freight between Liverpool and Rotterdam, increasing capacity and cutting carbon emissions. BG Freight Line is introducing four new vessels onto its Liverpool to Rotterdam cargo route that it says will slash carbon emissions. A subsidiary of Port of Liverpool owner, Peel Ports, BG Freight Line says the four new ships – BG GREEN, BG BLUE, BG RED, and BG ORANGE – are 70m long and can carry up to 1,380 containers. This is 300 containers more than the older vessels. That increased capacity will result in a lower carbon footprint per container. They will also use a state-of-the-art 'scrubber' to catch CO2 and sulphur particles.

The vessels are also equipped to handle biomethanol, allowing them to be powered by this more sustainable fuel source as it becomes increasingly available in ports. With the ships servicing the container route between Liverpool and Rotterdam, BG GREEN is the first in operation, having made her maiden voyage from the Port of Liverpool on April 27, with the other vessels set to come into service later this year.

David Huck, chief operating officer at Peel Ports Group, said: "Sustainability is at the heart of everything the maritime logistics sector can be."

June 2024

On Mon 3 June the new Cunard Line vessel QUEEN ANNE arrived in Liverpool for the first time at around 0630. Mersey Ferries put on special viewing cruises so as to enable people to get a good view of the new cruise ship. Her official naming ceremony took place at 1600 at the Pier Head.

With the opening of the new Isle of Man terminal at Liverpool pending, MANANNAN once again performed berthing trials at the new linkspan on both Tuesday 18 June and Wednesday 19 June. Meanwhile BEN-MY-CHREE departed Douglas during the afternoon of Wednesday 19 June and sailed to the Mersey Bar Anchorage where she dropped anchor. The following morning she entered the Number 7 Dry Dock at Cammell Laird, Birkenhead, for a full refit.

Paddle Steamer WAVERLEY arrived at Holyhead in the early morning of Mon 24 June after sailing light ship from Milford Haven. Her first sailing this century from the Anglesey port was at 0930 to cruise the north Anglesey coast viewing Moelfre and on to Llandudno from where she offered an afternoon cruise to Puffin Island and then an evening cruise to Seacombe.

The following two days of cruises out of Seacombe to Llandudno and cruises to Puffin Island and along the Anglesey coast went according to plan in fine sunny weather with very good loadings.

Meanwhile Mersey Ferries were experiencing various operational difficulties. On Wed 5 June due to high winds, the 1020 and 1120 River Explorer Cruises from Seacombe Ferry terminal did not operate due to being unable to safely board passengers. The River Explorer Cruise from Pier Head at 1000 and 1100 operateed a non-stop 50-minute cruise.

The annual Friends of the Ferries Across the Mersey Dock and River cruise scheduled for Sat 22 June was unfortunately called off due to continuing mechanical problems with ROYAL IRIS.

Better news was to be had a few days later when it was announced that 90% of tickets for the series of Manchester Ship Canal Cruises during the summer had already been sold. However with ROYAL IRIS still "struggling for fitness" only one ferry, SNOWDROP, was available to carry out all advertised sailings on Tues 25 June/Wed 26 June. As two fully booked Manchester Ship Canal cruises were in the schedule, all River Cruises and commuter services on these two days were cancelled as SNOWDROP sailed the canal. ROYAL IRIS OF THE MERSEY finally re-entered service on Thurs 27 June. All services were suspended due to a technical issue with SNOWDROP on Thurs 27 June from mid-morning onwards. However, services resumed at 1700 with ROYAL IRIS. SNOWDROP, which had been in more or less non stop service for several months, retired to the Liverpool Dock system for rest and recuperation! However yet another technical problem with ROYAL IRIS on Tues 2 July resulted in a cancellation of all sailings for the day. All sailings remained cancelled until Fri 5 July.

Preserved tug/tender DANIEL ADAMSON was also encountering operational difficulties. A boiler damper issue on Sat 22 June ruined her planned programme of sailing from Canning Half Tide Dock in Liverpool to Acton Bridge. The fault manifested itself just as the vessel was off the Queen Elizabeth II Dock and she managed to berth at Eastham with the help of the tug VB ELBE. MSC VOLANT assisted DANIEL ADAMSON to Ellesmere port where passengers were disembarked and the rest of the cruise was terminated. It transpired that the damper had sheared off and cruises on the following two days had to be cancelled. Fortunately, by Tues 25 June the issue had been resolved although the repairs had resulted in much cleaning needing to be done before she could return to service. She raised steam the following day and on 27 June returned to Sutton Weaver for cleaning prior to returning to service.

The new Liverpool Terminal for the Isle of Man Steam Packet Company opened on Tuesday 25 June. After further berthing trials by MANANNAN over the previous few days, and with a new berthing platform welded to her port side forward to enable her to load and unload foot passengers at very low water, she opened the new multi million pounds facility with the 1500 sailing ex Douglas's arrival at just before 1800. The first departure was the 1915 sailing returning to Douglas. A new era had begun.

All Mersey Ferry services were suspended due to a technical issue with SNOWDROP on Thurs 27 June from mid-morning onwards. However, services resumed at 1700 with ROYAL IRIS. SNOWDROP, which had been in more or less non stop service for several months, retired to the Liverpool Dock system for rest and recuperation!

July 2024

After many weeks in dry dock at Cammell Laird, Birkenhead, BEN-MY-CHREE left the Mersey during the morning of Thursday 25th July and sailed straight to Douglas. Her refit is thought to include the conversion of all cabins on the Starboard side on Deck 8 into crew accommodation, to enable the vessel to operate like MANXMAN, with live-on crew on board.

Yet another technical problem with ROYAL IRIS on Tues 2 July resulted in a cancellation of all sailings for the day. All sailings remained cancelled until Tues 9 July when sailings resumed at 1400 ex Liverpool with ROYAL IRIS struggling on.

Technical problems with SNOWDROP on Sat 20 July resulted in the cancellation of River Explorer sailings for the day. Services resumed at 1000 the following day.

CldN, who took over Seatruck Ferries in 2023, have decided to make a major investment in the Brocklebank Dock Terminal at Liverpool. The main aim is to increase cargo capacity on the Liverpool – Dublin service.

Infrastructure upgrades at the Dock will enhance the flow of cargo, there will be a new more efficient gate set-up and improved facilities for freight drivers. There will be a new terminal operating system to increase efficiency and enhancements on the quayside will facilitate the use of the terminal by larger and more environmentally efficient vessels.

The work will take about four months to complete and whilst it is going on, operations will move temporarily to Gladstone Branch No. 3.

Cunard Line Queen Anne naming at Liverpool By Dave Crolley

Cunard's newest Cruise Ship QUEEN ANNE arrived from Belfast at the Liverpool Cruise Terminal on Monday 3rd June 2024 at about 0700 for her naming ceremony. She was met off New Brighton by two tugs, SVITZER ELIZABETH and SVITZER BIDSTON that gave her a water canon greeting and then escorted her onto the cruise terminal. She stayed there until 1530 when she moved to a position in the river just off the Liver Building for her naming which began at 1600. At this point it was announced that the Godmother of the ship would be the City of Liverpool represented by five Liverpudlians, Spice Girl Melanie C, local broadcaster Ngunan Adamu, entrepreneur Natalie Haywood, musician Jayne Casey and British Olympian Katarina Johnson-Thomson who performed the naming with the usual smashing of a traditional bottle of champagne from the stage that had been built on the Pier Head. There was also music proved by the legendary Opera superstar Andrea Bocelli and the Royal Liverpool Philharmonic Orchestra plus other well known artists. At 2030 the evening entertainment was hosted by D.J. Craig Charles and at 2215 a grand firework display was held from the roof of the Cunard Building and a barge that was moored in mid river. QUEEN ANNE then sailed away at about 2230 for her next port of call the following day at Cobh, Southern Ireland.
